My Brilliant Friends: Ferrante and Domenico Starnone

Without knowing for certain who wrote what, we will read and discuss three novels by the best-selling and pseudonymous Elena Ferrante (*Troubling Love, My Brilliant Friend,* and *The Days of Abandonment.*) and two short novels by the man thought to be her husband, Italian novelist Domenico Starnone (*Ties*—which parallels *The Days of Abandonment* from the husband's point of view—and *Tricks*—whose couple-troubles are narrated by a grandfather). Since Ferrante believes books (and their authors) live separate and autonomous lives, we will concentrate on the stories, comparing and contrasting their setting (Naples), themes, characters, male/female points of view, narrative strategies, conflicts and psychology. This is a literary discussion course for people who love to read and talk about what they have read. 140-190 pages per week.

Textbooks are available as new and used paperbacks as well as on Kindle through http://www.amazon.com and elsewhere. In the past students have found books much easier than Kindles to access for class discussion. A detailed syllabus as well as additional discussion materials will be provided both in a Xeroxed package and emailed to students as a Word document file.
