Few people are interested and the frog dies of it." This course covers brief biographies including the comedians' rise to fame as well as via primarily video excerpts, a sampling of their more famous routines.

How much we will cover in the next several weeks depends on how much of each artist you want to see and hear — and I'll need your inputs as we progress from week-to-week. In that way, I can better make this course — your course. Just know, there are enough more modern day comedians to make three such courses but it's up to you to let me know if that is of interest to you.
