ELIZABETH STROUT'S LINKED SHORT STORIES

This discussion course for avid readers will explore Pulitzer Prize winner Elizabeth Strout's use of inter-related short stories to create complex novels of character and place. Her voice is compelling and her themes (love, marriage, infidelity, trauma, terrorism, aging, art, depression, poverty, class consciousness, anger) diverse. In *Olive Kittredge, Olive Again, Anything Is Possible*, and *I Am Lucy Barton*, Strout creates two American villages: Crosby, Maine, and Amgash, Illinois. She treats her complicated and difficult characters with compassion, understanding and humor.

In the past students have found books much easier than Kindles to access for class discussion. Class 2	Anything Is Possible, 3- 149	Characters and characterization: the traveling lens—emphasis on style and what it accomplishes.
Class 3	Anything Is Possible, 150-254	Revelations and Resiliency: the Imperfectability of Love
Class 4	My Name is Lucy Barton	Life of the Artist from a Hospital Bed; Mother and Daughter(s)
Class 5	Olive Kittredge, 3-139	Mothers and Sons; Husbands and Wives; Teachers and Students
Class 6	<i>Olive Kittredge</i> , 140- 270	For Better or Worse: Death, Divorce, Nastiness, Re-birth
Class 7	Olive, Again, 3-147	Birth and Death, Widowhood and Marriage— some moral issues.
